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Assembling a Healthy "Hive:" New York City Girls Paint Mural on Community Health

NEW YORK, NY – Groundswell, in partnership with Community League of the Heights (CLOTH) and the Community Health Academy of the Heights (CHAH), is pleased to announce a dedication ceremony celebrating the unveiling of a new mural entitled "Assembling the Future." Designed by a talented team of New York City young women, the mural illustrates that the building of a strong healthy child is a community responsibility.

To create this mural, a team of emerging young women artists participated in an intensive public artmaking program, presented with the support of the New York City Council through its STARS Citywide Girls Initiative. In collaboration with Lead Artist Crystal Bruno and Assistant Artist Leola Bermanzohn, the young women researched, designed, and fabricated this mural installed at 504 W 158th Street, New York, NY 10032.

"We wanted to empower young girls and women to create imagery that inspires both them and their community," said CLOTH Executive Director Yvonne Stennett. "Our services provide for the entire family, from child to senior citizen, and we are proud that the mural reflects how everyone contributes to a healthy community."

"Groundswell is excited to continue our partnership with CLOTH as part of the STARS Citywide Girls Initiative," Groundswell Executive Director Amy Sananman. "This project brought together powerful girls and young women of color and inspiring community partners. We thank all our supporters, and special thanks to Councilmember Ydanis Rodriguez for his generous support."

The mural design centers on a golden, smiling child covered with a honeycomb motif. A young woman and an elder help build the child by placing honeycombs where pieces were missing. Surrounding the three figures are hexagonal shapes which show other components of a community's health, such as education and housing. "Honeycombs are an advanced natural design," said Lead Artist Crystal Bruno, "because they get the most out of the least amount of material. Their stability, harmony, and efficiency represent CLOTH and CHAH's strength at promoting health."

The six partners—Girls Write Now, Groundswell, Lower Eastside Girls Club, PowerPlay NYC, Row New York, and Sadie Nash Leadership Project—all leaders in after-school and summer programming, will create 1,000 or more new program slots for girls in all five boroughs by June 2015.

With support and funding from the New York City Council, the STARS Citywide Girls Initiative will develop the life and leadership skills of NYC girls through after-school and summer sports, academic enrichment, STEM, college preparation and the arts. The launch of STARS will provide vital services to communities in all five boroughs to ensure that girls have access to a broad array of opportunities in team sports, college prep, financial literacy and technology--experiences that can prepare them for successful adulthood.
