Mural Unveiling in Park Slope

Youth Advocate for Traffic Justice in Vision Zero Mural

PARK SLOPE, NY – In New York City, approximately 4,000 New Yorkers are seriously injured and more than 250 are killed each year in traffic crashes. Because every New Yorker deserves to feel safe as a pedestrian, the citywide Vision Zero Action Plan aims for zero traffic deaths. As part of the Vision Zero initiative, Groundswell youth artists collaborated with the NYC DOT and wall-owner Michael Chuisano to create a 1,100-square foot educational mural in Park Slope about traffic justice. This mural, "Justice at the Crossroads," will be unveiled Friday, August 28 at 10 am.

As part of Groundswell's flagship Summer Leadership Institute, a team of youth researched and developed a design highlighting Vision Zero in a curriculum led by Lead Artist Marc Evan and Assistant Artist Adan Palermo. NYC DOT representatives educated the youth artists in the goals and elements of Vision Zero. The young people also met with street safety activists and families of community members killed by collisions.

"It meant a lot to have a speaker that had actually been through something so tragic. It really hit home for all of us in the team and we're all greater advocates," said youth artist Daniela Umana.

The centerpiece of the mural is a grand image of Lady Justice, holding up her scales. There is a vehicle on one side of Justice's scales, outweighing our lost human lives represented on the opposing scale. Her blindfold has been removed to show that Lady Justice will not overlook injustice in car crashes. She stands at a crossroad, surrounded by protests, traffic signs, and several examples of recent Vision Zero initiatives such as new bike and bus lanes.

"This is the first year that we are doing specifically a Vision Zero mural," said NYC DOT Assistant Commissioner for Education and Outreach Kim Wiley-Schwartz. "We're trying to use any tool in our arsenal for culture change."

"It takes a community to make our streets safer," said Groundswell Executive Director Rob Krulak. "Park Slope has been at the forefront of the conversation about safe streets, and we hope Justice at the Crossroads' will help deepen support and engagement with Vision Zero and the campaign to end traffic fatalities."

"Justice at the Crossroads" stands as a call to action against the injustices created in traffic fatalities and addresses the four key principles of Vision Zero: education, enforcement, legislation, and street modification. With this mural, Groundswell youth advocates urge all New Yorkers to consider their part in keeping streets safe by centering justice in the Vision Zero dialogue.
