Mural Unveiling in Coney Island

As Coney Island Completes its First Summer After Superstorm Sandy, Youth Artists Celebrate Coney Island

Groundswell, in partnership with LISC New York City and Astella Development Corporation, is pleased to announce a dedication ceremony to celebrate the unveiling of a monumental public mural, entitled "Coney Island Rising Up."

This summer, 15 young women participating in Groundswell's Summer Leadership Institute (SLI) collaborated with renowned street artist Swoon and artists Yana Dimitrova and Jazmine Hayes to research, design, and fabricate this mural overlooking the Santos White Garden/Lighthouse Mission.

As a response to the devastation caused by Superstorm Sandy, teen artists drew from stories of healing and recovery to create a visual narrative that captures the concerns, hopes, and overall spirit of Coney Island. The mural was created as part of Recovery Diaspora, a collaborative citywide public art installation created by Swoon, together with youth from Red Hook, Coney Island, Staten Island and the Rockaways, among the neighborhoods most affected by the storm.

Following a series of interviews with Coney Island residents and business owners impacted by Superstorm Sandy, the youth muralists utilized expressionist techniques to illustrate the pain and emotion of the experiences shared in these interviews. The design centers around a central mermaid figure, which evokes both the iconic image of the Coney Island boardwalk, and honors the local mom and pop businesses along Mermaid Avenue. Light emanates from this central figure, while movement is created through repetition, in a reference to Swoon's signature printmaking technique.

"This dynamic mural brings to life stories of recovery from the perspective of youth affected by Superstorm Sandy. It highlights the importance of the continuing rebuilding efforts in these devastated, but resilient, communities," said LISC New York City's Managing Director Denise Scott.

"The young women artists from Groundswell, including those from Coney Island, did an amazing job in visually depicting the resilience of our community following Superstorm Sandy," said Judi Orlando,

Executive Director, Astella Development Corp. "This mural is a testament to residents, business owners, non-profit agencies, and faith-based organizations all working together in recovery efforts."

"This mural is for the love of Coney Island – its community gardens, mom and pop shops, vibrant boardwalk, and its people," said Groundswell Executive Director Amy Sananman. "And this mural is for the future of Coney Island, a hopeful and more resilient future as envisioned by these extraordinary youth artists.

These murals will be tied together by a temporary site-specific mural on the famed Bowery Mural wall, created by Swoon herself. Scheduled to coincide with the anniversary of the storm in October, it will

be a testament to both resilience and vulnerability, and by engaging the public in its design, it will serve to highlight the importance of continued relief efforts by and for Sandy's victims.
